Main Idea: A glimpse of heaven!

Icebreaker: Based on what you've always believed about heaven, how would you explain your thoughts about it to someone? What do you think heaven will be like and why do you think that?

Study:

Read **John 14:1-6** and use the following points and questions to discuss this week's sermon.

Three Misconceptions We Have About Heaven:

1. Misconception #1: Heaven Will Be Boring.

- Have you ever thought this? Why?
- **Read 1 John 3:2.** What do we learn about heaven/eternity? (*We will be like Jesus and see him as he fully is.*)
- **Read 1 Corinthians 15:35-54.** What do we learn about heaven in this passage? (*We will get perfect bodies!*)
- **Read Revelation 21:4.** What amazing promises of heaven do we learn of in this passage?

2. Misconception #2: This World is Our Home.

- **Read Philippians 3:18-21.** Even if we believe heaven is our true home, in what ways are you tempted/lulled into thinking that this world is our home?
- How does it affect how you live your day-to-day life when you lose focus on eternity and put too much focus on this world being our home?

3. Misconception #3: Most People are Going to Heaven Anyway.

- **Read Matthew 7:13-14.** What does this passage teach us about the relative numbers of people who will be going to heaven vs. hell?
- How do you usually think about this misconception? Do you tend to assume most good people will be there?

Application:

1. Why is it so important for our lives right now to spend time studying and reflecting on heaven and what it will be like? How does that affect our lives?
2. Do you struggle to keep eternity in mind as you live your everyday life? How can you be more intentional to think about eternity more frequently?
3. What is one step of obedience you need to take or one change in your thinking you need to make in response to our study today?

Close your group time with intentional prayer for each other and for our church. Pray that God would help us to keep eternity in mind as we live our everyday lives so that we can live with an eternal impact on those around us.
